Mental Health Facilitator's Three Day Training-Protea Hotel Victoria Island **Lagos State** WHAT YOU'LL FIND INSIDE:

Under the leadership of Dr. Eniabitobi Kuyinu, founder and Executive Director of the non-profit organization, The Educator Inc., a team of 6 members based in the United States from Atlanta, Georgia and Denver, Colorado headed to Nigeria. Upon arrival the team was welcomed with open arms by team members and staff from The Educator Africa. All team members from The Educator USA and Africa were on ground from June 22-July 7 for mental health trainings, character based relationship training, sexual integrity education, speaking engagements and other servant leader opportunities. The team covered a lot of ground and conducted trainings in various parts of the mainland of Lagos, to Victoria Island, as well as to the South Eastern region in Anambra State. The team was also able to embrace the tastes and sounds of the rich Nigerian culture through food and traveling the heavily populated roads of Lagos. Day 1 included the training of Private School Owners on creating an ideal environment that supports mental wellness for students. This training was held in Surelere Lagos and anchored by Dr. Eniabitobi Kuyinu and supported by Mrs. Ore Odunsi, Regional Coordinator for The Educator Africa.

"Stress Busters" With Dr. Yolanda Fountain **Principals and Vice Principals** From 98 Public Schools in Lagos State

The Intersection of Education & Mental Health

Day 2 and 3 consisted of training 173 Principals and Vice Principals, 80 teachers, and 65 school counselors from 98 schools in the Educational District IV Sabo, Lagos. These trainings were anchored by Dr. Eniabitobi Kuyinu, Dr. Yolanda Fountain, Miss Renee Bryan, and supported by Mrs. Ore Odunsi. The focus of the training for the principals and vice principals was to learn how to create the ideal environment to support mental wellness by learning how to practice and incorporate stress management techniques into the workplace. Participants also learned about emotional intelligence for the purpose of cultivating better staff relationships. The focus of the trainings for the teachers and the school counselors were to better equip them on childhood disorders such as ADHD and Autism in order to be able to create ideal environments for Child and Adolescent mental and behavioral health. Mental Health awareness was also cultivated through the use of play and stress buster activities.



International Mental Health Training was a three day certification training on how to provide mental and emotional support from a layman's perspective. The training was also inclusive of understanding the importance of investing in mental health, understanding ethical boundaries, suicidality and prevention, various aspects of trauma, dealing with substance abuse as well as depression and anxiety. The training also incorporated ways to manage mental health and stress levels and reduce the risk of cardiovascular and other stress related diseases through therapeutic breathing and relaxation techniques. Training sessions were also conducted on best practices for working with behavioral disorders and learning disabilities such as ADHD and Autism in children and adolescents. A total number of 41 participants were recorded for this training that took place at Protea Hotel, Victoria Island, Lagos Nigeria. Training was also done simultaneoulsy at This Present House (TPH) church in Lekki-Lagos on the topics of suicide, trauma, and substance abuse. The trainings were anchored by Dr. Eniabitobi Kuyinu, Dr. Yolanda Fountain, Miss

Renee Bryan, Dr. Dan Sartor, and Dr. Sonja Sutherland.

Character Based Relationships and Sexual Integrity Education

Character Based Relationships and Sexual Integrity Education Training (CBRSIE) was a three day certification training for individuals working with teens and young adults to help them to navigate through 21st century issues. Discussions regarding parenting and healthy relationships were anchored by Mrs. Andrea Mosby-Jones and held at the (RCCG) City of David Church (COD) on Victoria Island, Lagos and at the Medical Research Center in Yaba, Lagos. A total number of 71 participants attended the training. Mrs. Andrea Mosby-Jones was also a guest speaker for the Weekly Women's Meeting at (COD). The Passion Purity and Purpose Conference was also held at (RCCG) The Master's Court, Lekki-Lagos. This conference was attended by approximately 500 youth inclusive of parishioners and pastoral and community leaders. The focus of the conference was to highlight the importance of purity and the sense of urgency in the channeling of passion into purpose amongst 21st century youth. Awareness and information surrounding topics such as sexually transmitted diseases, abortion, sexual identity, and the purpose of godly intimate relationships were discussed. The speaker and anchor for this event was Dr. Eniabitobi Kuyinu.

Stress Buster Boot Camp

The Stress Buster Boot Camp was a one day workshop for individuals in high stress occupations. The trainings consisted of psychological and emotional health as well as vital signs assessments. stress profile analysis, and sessions in wellness, nutrition, and stress management. Participants also learned about emotional intelligence and the role it plays within interpersonal relationships. There were a total number of 15 participants and this training was held at the City Hall, Victoria Island, Lagos. "Stress Busters" was an underlying theme of the overall trainings for this trip and participants had the opportunity to relieve stress during the various activities provided for them. The trainings were anchored by Dr. Eniabitobi Kuyinu, Dr. Dan Sartor, Dr. Yolanda Fountain, Mrs. Andrea Mosby-Jones, and Miss Renee Bryan.

Bringing Mental Health Awareness to Anambra State

The Educator Inc. in partnership with the Sir Emeka Offor Foundation conducted a mental health awareness desensitization training for diverse members of the community, workforce, as well as dignitaries, public officials and stakeholders in Anambra State. Members that were present included Sir Emeka Offor, members of his team, medical doctors, psychologists, medical and nursing students, widows, industry executives, men and women from the marketplace, and the police force. The training was held on July 6 and focused on the importance of investing in mental health and discussed the basic tools on how individuals could become community mental health facilitators. Dr. Sonja Sutherland.....

I am so grateful to have been afforded the opportunity to travel to Nigeria as a member of this unique team of clinicians and trainers. Although I had traveled to Kenya and Uganda on three occasions over the years, I have friends who hail from Nigeria, so this trip was most dear to my heart. Before leaving for Nigeria this past June, I spoke with close family and friends, students, coworkers, and supervisees about the trip and about our mission to support mental health efforts in the country. As expected, most verbalized support for the goal of increasing awareness and teaching basic skills for recognizing mental and emotional health concerns, and providing tools for intervening. One perspective presented to me, though not new, caught me off guard. I was asked, "What you're doing is great; but with so much need in our minority communities right here in America, why do you need to go to a another country when your resources and energy are so desperately needed right here?"

As a minority woman whose heart feels and understands the plight of her people in America, this question rested within me prior to my travels. Having now been to Nigeria, talked with her people, heard their stories, and experienced her as a country, I can respond definitively now with the truths that have reached my heart because of this trip.

The need for mental health awareness, training, and treatment is significant in Nigeria, just as the need is significant here in America's minority communities. Yet these simultaneous needs neither negate nor diminish each other. But what I found to be most compelling during my time in Nigeria, is that the financial and human resources for meeting their mental health needs are significantly fewer there than they are here at home in the U.S.

What also rang true as I met and connected with Nigerian men and women, was their sincere hunger for knowledge, understanding and resources for intervening in desperate situations. As community leaders, professionals and parents communicated their experiences, it was clear that these existed along-side a very real fear that the very fabric of what makes Nigeria great was being torn apart by the mental and emotional health needs brought on in part by the impact of rapid globalization and oppression experienced within the country.

As a Black American woman of Jamaican heritage I understood this fear and desperation from a visceral place. I think this is what contributed to the strong experiential kinship I felt during my time there. Equally impacting was the openness with which they received us, and the comraderie, acceptance, friendliness and hospitality shown to us. Every day I was humbled as I understood more of their plight, and as I also learned more of what makes Nigerians strong, resilient and amazing. Because I am grateful and humbled, I am compelled to hold their plight and ours in equal standing in my heart, to do all I can to help teach and equip and provide resources, and then to pray for others to join us along the way.
